America's Finest City got a little bit finer on Wednesday, as 1,129 Kappas arrived at the Sheraton San Diego Hotel & Marina for Kappa Kappa Gamma's 71st Biennial Convention. Fraternity Vice President [Elizabeth Bailey, Mississippi](#), and Convention Chairman [Lara Meinheit Miller, Illinois](#), were California-ready, wearing illusion bikini-bod T-shirts as they delivered their Welcome Dinner speech inside a massive white pavilion tent lit with technicolor lights and beachy accents. "I was looking for the beach," Elizabeth told the crowd, "But there's no place I would rather be than in a room filled with happy Kappas!"

Since 1986, the Parade of Flags has been the highlight of the Welcome Dinner. This year, collegiate members from the Fraternity's 139 chapters took to the catwalk bearing one-of-a-kind flags representing each chapter's personality and location. Following the parade, a lip sync video showcased the lighter side of the 2014–2016 Fraternity Council members, as they showed off their lip sync skills. To cap off the evening, Kappas satisfied their sweet tooth at an al fresco dessert reception, noshing on churros, chocolate eclairs, and salted caramel tarts and taking in the view as the sun set over the San Diego marina.



AN INDOMITABLE SISTERHOOD



Kappa's Fraternity President shares her vision for the way ahead.



For 146 years, we have maintained a set of values that align with our founding principles. Our purpose remains the same: We are women supporting women and that will never change.

As Kappas, we have much to celebrate. Since our founding in 1870, we have initiated 273,725 outstanding women. We are fortunate to have 3,700 dedicated volunteers. We have made a positive impact on the lives of 524 middle school girls through GIRLS Academies. And our alumnae associations and chapters have raised over a half million dollars for the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation.

Our exciting new initiatives are numerous. Our Every Member Program will launch this fall. We have addressed the issue of gender violence through Not Anymore and It's On Us. This academic year, we will pilot the Alcohol Skills Training Program to help members understand the effects of alcohol on their bodies.

Kappa Kappa Gamma is fortunate to have a strong brand. We have powerful name recognition and a solid reputation. When it comes to innovation and new ideas, however, we are resting on our laurels. Our current organizational structure simply doesn't allow the Fraternity Council to get out of the weeds and concentrate on a strategic vision. The bar has been raised, and in order to remain competitive, we must jump higher.

To help Kappa Kappa Gamma maintain its status as a premiere women's Greek organization in the 21st century, the Long-Range Planning Task Force has presented a plan for an organizational structure that draws on expertise in higher education, data from similar volunteer organizations and years of Fraternity experience.



As often happens in times of significant change, there has been trepidation regarding this plan. As an organization of over 200,000 members, there will be times when we don't all agree—and that is okay. Differing points of view provide us with multiple perspectives when solving problems and addressing issues that affect the Fraternity. So long as we are willing to set aside our personal preferences for the good of the whole, Kappa will maintain its status as an indomitable sisterhood. Just think of the impact we can make—in our chapters, our alumnae associations, our campuses and communities and for the greater good—by harnessing the incredible talents and energy of our members when we work toward a common end.

The decisions we make this week will impact Kappa for many years to come. We have built a roadmap to ensure Kappa Kappa Gamma's sustainability. Our greatest hope is that we can move forward together—remembering that in union there is strength, respecting each other regardless of the outcome of our decisions and embracing our ideals and values, always seeking the beautiful and the good.

FACING FORWARD



What will sorority life look like in five years? More importantly, how can Kappa prepare for the changes ahead?

For Jessica Gendron Williams, CEO of Phired Up, Innova and TecniPhi, the answer is to face change and prepare for success. Jessica addressed the Convention body in Friday's Keynote Address with a clear message: Prepare for the future or prepare to be left in the past.

Forget the Millennials. Generation Z has now arrived on college campuses. They're a pragmatic, realistic and hard-working bunch, according to Jessica. That's the good news. The bad news (for organizations like Kappa, at least) is that they are less likely to join groups and are more competitive individually. Additionally, having grown up during the Great Recession of 2007–2008, they want to know their return on investment on everything. To compete for these students' time, talents and treasure, sororities will need to shift recruitment conversations to include more value-driven details on the long-term benefits of membership.

"If we can get them to join, they're going to work really, really hard for Kappa, and they're going to make a great impact for you," Jessica said.

Jessica challenged Kappa to continue to excel and lead. "Your founders did not gather in Monmouth, Illinois, and say, 'Let's be average. Cool?'" she said.

Jessica believes that for Kappa (and our Panhellenic friends) to thrive in the midst of change, recruitment decisions—now more than ever—need to be based more on a potential new member's character and whether it aligns with the values of the Fraternity.

"The whole goal of sorority is to become better than us," Jessica said, motioning toward the audience. In this way, Jessica says, Greek organizations like Kappa will be best positioned to reach their objective of continued improvement.



IDEALS WORTH SPREADING

In the spirit of TEDx—a popular a series of public speaking events focused on “ideas worth spreading”—the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation presented KKGx to share ideals worth spreading at the Foundation Luncheon, held on Thursday afternoon.

“We’re on a mission,” said Beth Burkes, Foundation Executive Director. “Our mission is to make you feel what we do. And it’s in your power to continue to make a difference.”

Kay Reid Tennison, Arizona State, recognized chapters and alumnae associations for outstanding giving during the 2014–2016 biennium. “Because of you, we are all inspired,” Kay said. “You belong in the KKGx spotlight.”

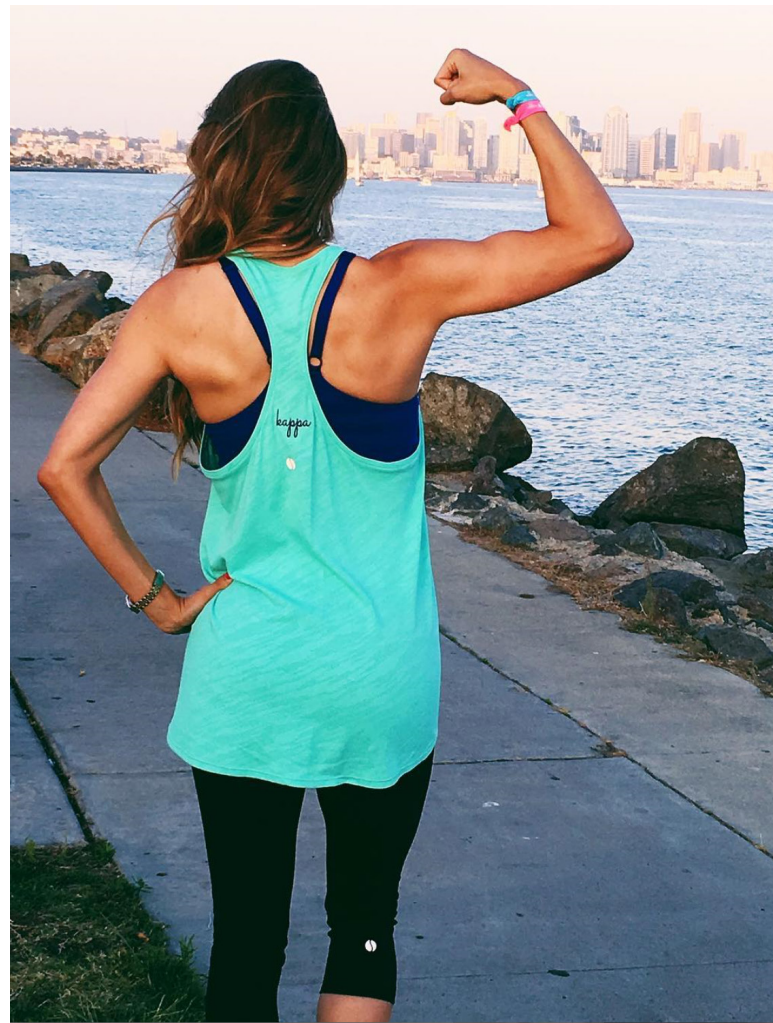

- In May 2016, Kappa was recognized as one of RIF's Legacy of Literacy Award honorees.
- RIF has developed a book collection inspired by Kappa, incorporating themes and content based on our Fraternity colors and symbols.

A CHANGE FOR GOOD

Voting delegates at the 71st Biennial Convention approved the proposed revisions to the Fraternity *Bylaws* and *Standing Rules*.

By adopting these revisions, Kappa Kappa Gamma will be well-positioned to achieve the goals outlined by the Long-Range Planning Task Force:

- To more effectively meet the needs of undergraduate members and alumnae
- To better utilize and develop the skill sets of our members
- To provide volunteers with roles that are more rewarding, more manageable and less time-consuming
- To allow Fraternity Council to create a clear vision for our organization
- To ensure our relevance and perpetuate Kappa's ideals for future generations of women.

"The Fraternity's new structure will provide better support for chapters and associations through content specialists in a variety of areas," said Long-Range Planning Chairman **Logan Krogh Tootell, UCLA**. "Additionally, Fraternity Council will be able to focus on strategic planning for the Fraternity."

After the close of Convention, the newly elected Fraternity Council will begin the process of implementing the new structure and communicating more specifics with Kappa membership. "We will recommend that the new Fraternity Council immediately appoint a transition team at the close of Convention to help facilitate the work ahead," Logan said. Training and coaching for newly elected and appointed volunteers will begin in July.

PROFILES IN ACHIEVEMENT

First established at the 1946 General Convention, the Alumnae Achievement Award is the highest honor for personal and professional achievement that the Fraternity presents to its members.

Seven extraordinary women were honored at the 71st Biennial Convention in San Diego.

Virginia "Ginni" Nicosia Rometty, *Northwestern*

Ginni is Chairman, President and CEO of IBM. She serves on the Council on Foreign Relations, the Board of Trustees of Northwestern University, and the Board of Overseers and Board of Managers of Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center.

Donna Tartt, *Mississippi*

Donna is an American fiction writer and author of the novels *The Secret History* (1992), *The Little Friend* (2002) and *The Goldfinch* (2013). She won the WH Smith Literary Award in 2003 for *The Little Friend* and the Pulitzer Prize (Fiction) for *The Goldfinch* in 2014.

Jane Scott Offut Hodges, *Tulane*

As the owner and founder of Leontine Linens, known for its beautiful embroidered and appliquéd monograms on bespoke products that are designed, cut and sewn in the U.S. Jane Scott is the author of *Linens: For Every Room and Occasion*, a guide to living and entertaining with fine linens.

Punch Hutton, *Northwestern*

As deputy editor at Vanity Fair, Punch curated the culture and lifestyle sections called "FanFair" and "Fairground," and worked on the team that produces and hosts the annual Vanity Fair parties at the Oscars and the Cannes International Film Festival.

Convention attendees received video greetings from Shelly and Gretchen, followed by panel discussion with the three recipients present—Bev, Punch, and Jane Scott. Former Fraternity President, **Juliana (J.J.) Fraser Wales, *Ohio State***, explored the stories behind their achievements, followed by questions from the audience.

Gretchen Carlson, *Stanford*

Gretchen is the anchor of "The Real Story with Gretchen Carlson" on FoxNews. She was crowned the 1989 Miss America while representing her native state of Minnesota, and serves on the board of the Miss America Organization and as a spokesperson and national trustee for the March of Dimes. Gretchen published her memoir, *Getting Real*, in 2015.

Shelley Moore Capito, *Duke*

Shelley was elected by the people of West Virginia to the United States Senate in 2014. Shelley also served West Virginia's Second Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives for 14 years and prior to that was a member of the West Virginia House of Delegates for four years.

Beverly Eaves Perdue, *Kentucky*

Elected governor of North Carolina in 2008, Bev was the first female chief executive of the state. She has also held two terms at Lieutenant Governor and seven terms in the North Carolina Senate and House. She is the founder of the nonprofit organization, DigiLEARN: Digital Learning Institute, and currently serves as a senior adviser at Whiteboard Advisors.

Hosting a biennial Convention with over 300 delegates and more than 1,000 attendees is quite an undertaking—in fact, a 140-page protocol manual (with charts and diagrams) governs details such as how much pipe and drape is hung (a lot), down to color-coded meal cards for special diets (a lot of those, too) as well as signs to convert all Convention Hall restrooms to women’s only for the week.

It takes more than 40 volunteers to execute a Convention this large (one of the largest in the Greek-letter world), but at the center of it all is Convention Chairman **Lara Meinheit Miller, Illinois**, and Assistant Convention Chairman **Karen Bosch, Minnesota**. This year marks the third time this duo has planned Convention, apparent in the seamless production of such a large and complex event.

The Convention location is selected years in advance,

and event planning begins two years ahead. It is a labor of love for Staging Chairman **Allyson Coffey, Oklahoma**, who has been involved with Kappa’s event staging for 30 years.

Convention is the place to elect new officers, educate our members and report on the business of the last biennium, but it is also a place to strengthen the bonds of sisterhood. A still-smiling (as always) Lara Miller captured it well: “It is a mix of exhaustion and the best place to recharge my Kappa battery,” she reflected.

At the close of the Business Meeting on Saturday, it was announced that Convention 2018 will be held in Denver, Colorado. And while Convention 2016 is barely on the books, plans for the 72nd Biennial Convention are already afoot—get ready, Mile High City, for 1000+ Kappas!

KAPPA KAPPA GAMMA'S HIGHEST HONOR

A Visionary Thinker

"A Kappa treasure," "mentor," and "visionary thinker" are just a few of the words used to describe the 2016 Loyalty Award recipient, **Patricia Coffee Gesell, Penn State**.

Patty was initiated at **Delta Alpha Chapter, Penn State**, in 1967, where her mother was a charter member. Two of Patty's aunts were also members of Delta Alpha Chapter. In 1996, Patty's daughter, **Melissa Gesell Waterstredt**, pledged Kappa at **Zeta Phi, Princeton**. Melissa was destined to be a Kappa since mother made her learn the Greek alphabet when she was little so she could help with the filing!

In addition to representing Kappa Kappa Gamma at the National Panhellenic Conference, Patty has served the Fraternity in many capacities: Province Director of Alumnae; Assistant to the Director of Membership; Advisory Board Committee; Program Committee; Director of Chapters; History Chairman; Risk Management; Regional Director of Chapters; Assistant to the Treasurer; Coordinator of Chapter Development; Chapter Council Adviser to Zeta Rho Chapter, Zeta Beta Chapter and Psi Chapter; Panhellenic Affairs Committee; NPC Alternate Delegate; and NPC Delegate (present).

Among Kappa friends and NPC friends, Patty is known as a hard-working, and fast-typing volunteer. Fraternity President Beth Black asked for a show of hands of those who have received an email from Patty that required a third party to interpret. "Patty's mind works so quickly that we mere mortals have a hard time keeping up," quipped Beth.

There are few areas of the Fraternity Patty hasn't

touched. In addition to her Kappa volunteer roles, Patty also serves on the Northeast Greek Leadership Association Board.

A creative and visionary thinker, Patty has a unique ability to connect with today's college students. Ever the teacher, she is always willing to share her knowledge and experience to help chapter officers and volunteers.

When Patty's husband Perry Gesell surprised her by attending the presentation of the Loyalty Award, she thanked him for supporting her Kappa endeavors, saying, "You have been my support for 42 years."

Reflecting on the award, Patty recognized the six Loyalty Award winners present at Convention, saying, "These women ... I don't hold a candle to you, but I honestly look forward to joining you."



THE LOYALTY AWARD

Established in 1956, the award honors Helena Flinn Ege, Pittsburgh, Director of Alumnae 1944–48 and Fraternity President 1948–52 and recognizes years of devoted service and commitment to the Fraternity's values. When the award was first presented in 1956, **Helen Cornish Hutchinson, Oklahoma**, then Director of Alumnae, said:

"The beginning of the Kappa experience must come in the chapter, continue in alumnae work, and close only with life itself. This is a tremendous force, spread over a long period of time, with almost awe-inspiring opportunities for direction and inspiration ... If I were to choose one Kappa quality, I think it would be loyalty to the Fraternity, for Kappa loyalty implies the acceptance and execution of Kappa ideals."

IN LIVING MEMORY

Fraternity Ritual Chairman **Susanne Wolff Vander Heyden**, *Washington State*, led Friday morning's Memorial Service honoring Kappas who died during 2014–2016.
